William Alan Jones

Alan died on 25th November 2022 after a stay in hospital. Born on 19th June 1944, he was brought up in Treherbert, Rhondda and went to the local grammar school. The family moved away later and, with training in accountancy, Alan found work in the greater London area. He became a manager at Heathrow airport sorting out the 'duty free' to go in aeroplanes and ships, often travelling abroad. When he met Marlene they ran an off-licence together in Putney.

Alan and Marlene eventually settled in New Buckenham, running Kings Stores where Angel Cakes is now. The business didn't do well and his sight was failing so following Marlene's unexpected death in 1990 he moved into No 1 Almshouse a couple of years later.

In later life his constant companions were his guide dogs Jeeves, Katie and Andy. These enabled him, after a fashion, to walk the village and attend social events despite sometimes getting lost. Without his last dog Alan became more withdrawn but in earlier times he was usually at the Kings Head on a Saturday morning, occupying 'compost corner' with a collection of like-minded friends. He particularly enjoyed attending village funerals although regretted the absence of professional wailing mourners as he had experienced in his Welsh childhood.

Alan's abiding passion was the varying fortunes of the Welsh Rugby Union team and he placed the Welsh flag over his washing line every time they played against England. He particularly liked his (English) neighbours to be with him for the televised match. Drink was taken and each other's countries were insulted. His many visitors kept him well informed about the village but he wasn't easy company; his cantankerous, contrary nature often got the better of him while at other times he could be kind and generous.

Alan's funeral was held on 23rd December at St. Martin's Church. He had planned every detail including the draped Welsh flag, tolling bell and refreshingly short service.

Summary of Draft Minutes January

Present: Karen Hobley (KH) Chair, Andrew Bingham (AB), Mary Manning (MM), Andrew Nettleton (AN), Don Crossman (DC), Mary Dowson (MD), Steve Askew (SA) District/County Councillor, and Angela Thornton (AT) Clerk.

Apologies Steve Highton.

Minutes of the December approved as correct.

1. Matters Arising

- a) BOAT: cannot be applied for until 2024.
- b) Village Gateway: NCC will support but not additional road markings. AB to obtain costings with a view to Parish Partnership 50/50 split. SA agreed to support with some funding from his budget.
- c) Defibrillator: grant application complete, decision in two weeks.
- d) Project Fund: AN to forward updated paperwork to AT to update website.
- e) Speeding: awaiting article in *Parish News* to recruit volunteers for a speed survey.
- f) Community Woodland: following the interest in the article in Parish News, AB to arrange a meeting.
- g) Green Issues: A meeting to be arranged, an electric car charging point to be on the agenda.
- h) High Bailiff's Trust meeting to discuss the location of the restored bench and plaque.

- ii) Community Car Scheme: Gerry Walsh explained the difficulties of obtaining medicals and eye tests for the drivers. She stated her wish to stand down as coordinator in April. SA suggested a possible merger with other villages in the area.

- c) Community Project Group recommendation for funds for the Junior Football Club was approved.
- d) Payments for January approved.

4. Planning

Bleak Future for the Black Poplar?

Many people will be aware that the Black Poplar tree is rare, but how rare is rare? Are there really only TWO of them in the whole of Norfolk?

A shocking article in the EDP at the beginning of January made this claim:

'The Black Poplar has the dubious honour of being the UK's most endangered native tree. ... The species has been in deep decline since the 1850s, with just 7,000 thought to be growing in Britain, of which only 600 are female trees. Conservationists have, identified trees at Hardwick and Tibenham as being the only two examples left in Norfolk.'

That's odd because we have known for years about the spectacular specimen on a field up Cuffer Lane to one side to the Tas Valley Way. Investigation was in order!

It was the Otter Trust which had done nationwide surveys and, using cuttings, is planning to plant more than 50 to ensure the survival of the species. Their campaign is about to go live. The man responsible for it is Ben Grief, the Director of Conservation and Education. He'd had scores of emails after the article. He was furious.

'The EDP got it completely wrong. The article should say that the two trees mentioned at Tibenham and Hardwick are the only two individuals of very rare clones 42 and 45.

I am well aware that there are more, as I personally visited all of them and took samples for DNA testing and cuttings for planting. There are 78 veteran BPs in Norfolk (many more if you include the ones pumped out by the county council in the 90s - although these are birth male clones 25 and 28 - the commonest). Your tree is female clone 23 - once thought to be the only female in the county - my work had actually discovered 5 more 23s across the county.

Norfolk has 6 genetically distinct trees - the vast majority being male 25 and 28, female 23, and now male 42 and 45 and a new individual that I discovered which is yet to be allocated an identification number.

The NB tree is a beautiful specimen.'

And as if this couldn't get more confusing: a dear friend who has been visiting NB from Northern Ireland for 30 years reports that he is aware of a Black Poplar near the Green in OLD Buckenham, and that there are reports of two new ones having been planted on



19th March 2018 to celebrate the Diamond Wedding Anniversary of Max and Pauline Bott. They had been raised by Pauline from cuttings taken from the old one on the green, which, to top it all, is said to be one of those rare and beautiful things... A FEMALE!

The lesson is: report and record all environmental issues you spot and, of course, don't blindly believe everything you read in the papers! (Except this, of course!)

Pot Luck

If you have even the smallest of gardens, or even none at all, but just windowsills indoors, it's not possible that you haven't got, lurking somewhere, an unwanted plant pot... or two. Well let's be honest, in my case, it's scores more than that. And where have you put them? In the shed? In a corner down the garden? Or maybe you just throw them in the bin? The problem is that they are almost always perfectly re-usable. They've had one flower in them and now you're chucking it away - the pot not the flower! Worse still, many of them are not recyclable. I decided to try to do my thing for the planet. I went online. I phoned garden centres. I got in the car and drove to Diss, to Attleborough, to Bressingham, to Norwich. Wherever I went they rejected them and then, perhaps by way of consolation, asked what colour were the pots? If they were black, they pointed out, they probably wouldn't be recyclable anyway. Other colours might be, but you'd have to check the codes on the side, and then you'd have to check the facilities of your particular district council. It's 2023! Surely there should be simpler solutions by now? I couldn't bear to look at the waste. And then I called in at the Thetford Garden Centre at Kilverstone, IP24 2RL. Write that postcode down. NOW! They explained how it works. You take all your pots and put them in a big container in the outdoor area. Anyone who wants to use them, takes them for free. When the container overflows a truck takes them away and grinds them down to make PLANT POTS. Hooray! I've done one small thing for the planet. And how much better my conscience feels. I hope you noted that postcode!
