Goodbye Joan

I came to the village in October 1959 with my father (the new Vicar) and my mother Joan and my sister.

Joan lived in the Vicarage until my father's death in April 1977 and then moved to Foxes, Boosey's Walk, where she lived until February 2021, when she moved to DeLucy House in Diss. Joan loved New Buckenham and touched the lives of many generations. She and my father started what is now the New Buckenham Parish News in the early 1960s and I remember the monthly ritual well of the smell of the gestetner machine printing them and then drying on the dining room table before collating them and stapling together.

Joan died peacefully on Friday 15th September 2023. She was 100 years and 10 months.

Joan's funeral will be held at New Buckenham Church on Friday 6th October at 11:30am and afterwards at the King's Head for anyone who would like to join the family for a light buffet and toast her life. Community Speedwatch Update

I am sure we have all been much relieved by the reopening of the A11 and the village is notably quieter traffic wise. I would like to report that speeding in the village has likewise dropped off but, as our Sunday 17th September figures show (our most recent session at the time of writing), drivers continue to disregard the 20-miles-per-hour limit and on Sunday morning, we recorded 24 speeding vehicles in an hour, with nearly half of them (11) driving in excess of 30 miles per hour. The Speedwatch team regularly see speeds in excess of 30 miles per hour, with some vehicles driving well over 40 miles per hour; 41% of speeding vehicles in fact. This is worrying given the nature of our roads and the fact that many are speeding past the park and Common entrance area, a popular place for children and walkers. On Two Wheel Tuesday we can record speeding motorbikes in double figures when, usually, we only see 1 or 2 speeding bikes in an hour; overall however, the majority of speeding vehicles are private cars (81%). We have so far reported 228 speeding motorists during August and September and we have been advised by the Norfolk Constabulary that this is an unusually high amount of speeding vehicles for such a small village. We are working with the Parish Council, Breckland District Council and the police to deter motorists from continuing to disregard the law and we ask all villagers to respect the speed limit

which is there for safety and environmental reasons. We appreciate that being tailgated through the village is not pleasant, but if we all stick to the limit this will eventually pay off as passing traffic will expect to slow down in New Buckenham.

We have a dedicated team of 10 volunteers, but would welcome further volunteers as we intend to continue our monitoring throughout the winter months. Please feel free to email me on susan felton@hotmail.co.uk if you would like further information.

News from the Pews

Coffeemates!: Huge thanks to bakers, stall holders, passing cyclists and all who supported our September coffee morning in aid of the British Heart Foundation. We raised a new record sum of £277.50! Our final event of the year is the Harvest coffee morning on Saturday 7th October raising funds for YANA, a charity which supports the wellbeing of those who work in agriculture and rural businesses. All welcome from 10:30am for coffee, cake and raffle.

Harvest Evensong: This will be followed by a traditional Harvest Thanksgiving at 4:30pm on Sunday 8th October. Although fruit and veg make lovely decorations and will never be turned away, it can be difficult to distribute afterwards, so we invite you to bring jars, tins and packets into church during the previous week or to the coffee morning, which we will donate to the Waveney Food Bank after the service.

Service Rota: We have established a new pattern now with a group service at one of our seven churches on the first Sunday of the month, Evensong here on the second Sunday, Holy Communion here on the third, and Morning Worship here on the fourth Sunday. Community Car Service

The community car service is provided by 'vetted' voluntary car drivers from the village, to enable those not able to access transport for non-emergency health-related journeys such as hospital/GP/ optician/dental or other health appointments. The journey fare is charged at 45p per mile with the service user paying half the cost direct to the driver with the other half paid out of a grant from Breckland Council and the Parish Council. We currently have seven volunteer drivers, including the co-ordinator.

You will have noticed that four large posts have been erected around the site of the old Village Pump. This is in preparation for the installation of a new pump that Don Crossman has been able to source from Panks Pumps in Norwich. He was lucky, as it was the last one they had.

We had an onsite meeting with the man from Panks to see if it was possible to actually have a working pump, and it is, providing the water is OK and we have to have it tested first.

The well is 6 metres deep and there is 2.2 metres of water in it at present, so more than enough to supply a hand operated pump. We will have to have work done to the top to take the new pump, but things are in hand and we will keep you posted.

Our October Parish Council meeting will take place on Tuesday 10th October at 7:30pm in the Village Hall. A warm welcome is extended to all parishioners. A reminder that the agenda relevant to each meeting will be posted on the noticeboard on the Village Green and on the website (newbuckenhampc.info) where you will also find further information about the Parish Council.

Parish Council meetings take place on the second Tuesday of every month. Remaining dates for 2023 are 14th November and 12th December.

Our Breckland Councillor, Steve Askew, attended our last meeting and drew our attention to the Breckland Mobile Food Store, which is part of the Nourishing Norfolk Network of Food Hubs, which has five in Breckland. The Mobile Food Store will be at Old Buckenham Village Hall, Abbey Road NR17 1RH on Fridays between 1:15pm and 2:15pm starting on 6th October.

Their purpose is to offer healthy and nutritious food and store cupboard staples at a reduced price. The workers who are on the bus can also signpost residents into support if they're having issues with things such as debt management or health and wellbeing. Alice Cattermole also attended the meeting and updated us with some of the statistics gathered by the Speedwatch group, details of which appear elsewhere in this Parish News. The Parish Council thanked Sue Felton, Alice and the rest of the Speedwatch group for the excellent work which they are undertaking.

Alice reminded us that the next Safer Neighbourhood Action Panel meeting for our area takes place on Thursday 19th October at 6pm at Attleborough Town Council Offices, Queen's Square, NR17 2AF. The SNAP meetings are priority-setting meetings for the local area and all are welcome to attend. The Parish Council has volunteered to hold a SNAP meeting in 2024 which will, hopefully, allow more people to attend.

Summary of Draft Minutes September 2023

Present: Karen Hobley (KH) Chair, Mary Manning (MM), Paul Martin (PM), Andrew Bingham (AB), Steve Askew (SA) District and County Cllr and Angela Thornton (AT) Clerk. Also in attendance, three parishioners.

- 1. Minutes of the July meeting confirmed as correct.
- 2. Matters Arising

a) Village Gateway: Action AB to complete Parish Partnership application process and submit by November 2023.

b) Defibrillator: Awaiting installation at the King's Head.

c) County Broadband Wayleave Agreement: Still with solicitors.

d) Establishment of community woodland: 1st choice potential site unavailable; 2nd site to be investigated. Action AB.

e) Electric Charging Point: NCC site survey complete. Action NBVH.

- f) Street lighting: Awaiting quote for shades and dimming times.
- g) Footpath No.2 stile/gate: Ramblers Association unable to help. The walkway has been closed by Norfolk Wildlife Trust.

- 3. Public Participation
 - a) Parish Cllrs

i) KH reported that a bucket of human excrement had been removed from outside the cemetery gate.

ii) Victorian lamppost in the churchyard is under repair. Clarity is required as to whether the lamp once recommissioned should be operated as other street lights or considered a monument within the Closed Churchyard maintenance. Action AT.

b) District/County Cllr

i) SA reiterated that the speed issues on B1113 unlikely to change.

ii) He advised that the Mobile Food Bank will be availablein Old Buckenham shortly. Information to go in ParishNews and on the New Buckenham Facebook site.

iii) AB questioned the standard of road repairs on Cuffer Lane. SA said that highways have instructed contractors to 'make good'

c) Parishioners

Community Speedwatch (presented by Alice Cattermole) has been operating since July following volunteer training by Norfolk Constabulary. They have been out 10 times usually for an hour at a time.

Findings: we experienced more speeding traffic than most villages as confirmed by Community Speedwatch administration. Many people seen speeding live in the village. Majority of cars were travelling well in excess of the limit. High 20s up to 40mph. More speeding at the Norwich end of the village posing danger to adults, children and animals using the Common and Play Area. Tailgating witnessed when vehicles slowed in response to monitoring. A good proportion of drivers slow down when they see monitoring. Volume of traffic significantly lower since reopening of A11.

We could treble the numbers caught speeding but we are limited to where we can stand and there must be a clear view with no other vehicles impacting the recording.

The fastest recording in the 20mph zone was 48mph.

We will attend the next SNAP meeting on 19th October.

The PC expressed their thanks to the Speedwatch group. KH to attend the SNAP meeting.

KH to request that Village Hall users are reminded of the village speed limit.

4. Financial Matters

Bank reconciliation for August approved. Payments for September approved.

5. Planning

Applications at 5 Chapel Street and Swallows Barn, Tanning Lane were considered: No objection.

6. Amenities

a) Closed Churchyard

i) KH highlighted shrubs growing across neighbours' windows. MM stated pruning of roses is required.
AT to contact BTS for the scope of their contracted work.

ii) AB reported the wild flower area has been cut, hay to be removed.

iii) Period Pointing have completed this year's maintenance. This will continue in April next year.

b) Cemetery

Registration on the Diocesan system is in place to allow reuse of some graves which are more than 85 years old, ongoing.

c) Allotments

BTS scheduled to complete some maintenance work. PC reviewed the allotment policy and amended to indicate they are available for residents of NB. Action AT to amend rules and update on website.

d) Play Area

DC arranging replacement and repair of broken log and possible replacement of worn signage. Carried forward to next meeting.

e) Public Footpaths

Footpath number 2, see Matters Arising.

f) Street Lights

Maintenance contract received, considered and agreed extension for 3 years with TT Jones. Action AT to request quote for shields and dimming after midnight.

7. Correspondence.

i) Email from National Association of Local Councils offered to provide NBPC email services that will meet 2023/4 audit requirements. Approved, AT to contact them to accept their offer. ii) Email from Brew Daisy to request a pitch for a 'cafe' once a week in NB. Cllrs agreed, due to the closure of the village cafe, to offer the car park at the Play Area as a venue

White Dead Nettle

Growing 20–60 cm tall and having, in part, the same name and similar leaves to the common stinging nettle they are NOT part of the same plant family. Dead nettle is from the same family as mint, basil, thyme and marjoram, but itself is not an aromatic herb. However, white dead nettle is edible. Before it flowers, the young leaves and shoots are tender enough to eat raw and the flowers can be added to salad. When the leaves are older and tougher, they may be bitter but can be steamed or lightly cooked like spinach.

Also known as bee nettle, archangel, white archangel, helmet flower, blind nettle and dumb nettle, white dead nettle flowers from as early as March up to December. If winter is mild, it can flower through the year proving valuable to bees and insects that do not hibernate.

The flower has a lower lip which acts as an insect landing strip. When looked at face-on there are dull ochre-coloured marks making a disjointed Y or M shape. Although not particularly distinctive to the human eye, with the bee's UV/blue vision they look almost black so highlight the entrance to the flower.

The flowers are pollinated by bumble and mason bees which are heavier than the honey bee and other insects. As it lands on the landing strip, the weight of the heavier bees opens the long tube of the flower enabling the bee's longer tongue to reach down to suck the tiny drop of nectar. The very slight scent of the flower is almost undetectable to us but is sufficient to attract insects. At this time of year, white dead nettle is particularly important when there are few other nectar producing plants in flower.

White dead nettle has been used medicinally for centuries. With its anti-inflammatory, antiseptic and astringent properties it can treat wounds, skin irritation and respiratory infections. A tea made from the leaves of the plant was often used to treat colds and coughs. There is a body of scientific research interested in the plant's potential health benefits, looking at its anti-bacterial and antiinflammatory properties as well as the possibility of effectively reducing the symptoms of anxiety and depression.

The flowers of white dead nettle are always in twos. This is because, according to the children's author, Enid Blyton, they are pixie shoes left outside their house. She wrote, 'Touch the shoes gently and maybe they will leave magic on your finger that will bring you good luck all that day'.

From the *Lamium album* family, the plant takes its name from a creature in Greek mythology, the Lamia. She was a woman who became a half-serpent child-eating monster, her name meaning 'gaping mouth'. Looking closely at the flower and the lips of the petals it does, indeed, look like a great gaping mouth. How cheery!
