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Open Gardens: A Perfect day

It started off cloudy in the morning and then the sun came out to warm everyone who came to visit the gardens. We couldn't have asked for more. And then 350 visitors turned up and at one point we had over 100 cars in the Village Hall car park. They had come to see the magnificent gardens of New Buckenham and they were not disappointed!

This year we had the Church, the Castle and 19 gardens, 9 of which were opening for the first time. To the "newbies" and the "oldies" we say a huge thanks for all the hard work they put in to get their gardens to such a high standard. We also have to thank all those who supplied cakes and edibles and the catering crew who dispensed them. Such was the demand that we ran out at 5:00pm!

Thanks, too, to everyone who visited the gardens. I say that because not only were there visitors from neighbouring villages, but there were many villagers who basically went round visiting their own village. And last, but by no means least, thanks to everyone else who assisted in making it a very profitable day. With the profits from the plant sales at the Oxley's and Janet Webb's village competition, we made £1,650. This is a significant improvement over previous years where the profits have been about £1,100, so you can see how much more successful this one has been. This means that the Village Show which normally makes a loss, is financially secure for at least two years, probably three.

When Jo Whetter and Caroline Greenwood set up the Village Show in 1995 they hoped to make a small profit that could go to charity. We will use some of the profits from Open Gardens to support gardening and other charities. However... we will still have another Open Gardens in two years' time, so happy gardening!

I would just like to say that we had many visitors from Carleton Rode and Old Buckenham and it would be a nice gesture to return the favour on the weekend of June 31st/July 1st when they have their events.

The High Bailiff's Trust

It would appear that there are some villagers who are unsure as to the responsibilities of the High Bailiff's Trust. Who or what is it? Well, someone has to look after the Market Cross, the Village Green, the Church clock and Chapel Hill pump on behalf of the village and the Trust does just that. We were set up back in 1983 by Dr Hamerton and Lennie Breeze to formalise the care of the above amenities under the auspices of the Charity Commission. The Green, of which a plan is available, is registered to the charity and so we are in effect the owners. The Trust consists of a Chairman, secretary, nominated trustee from the Parish council and co-opted trustees.

The current chairman is Jimpy Casson with a committee of Tony Hamerton (secretary), Karen Hobley (Parish council nominee), Steve Highton and Dr Rik Hoggett.

Our main problem, as with all charities, is money. At this moment in time we are living off the capital sum created when the Trust was first set up, plus the interest on that sum. As you can imagine in these days with a Bank Rate of 0.5% we are earning very little and at present we have no other income. Fortunately our outgoings are not great, but they do exceed our income. The greatest of these is the Green maintenance which costs us approximately £50 every two weeks during the summer to cut the grass and strimming. We also have an electricity supply into the Market Cross which is used principally for lighting the Christmas tree. This costs a lot more than you would expect. There is also the weeding and maintenance required around the Market Cross.

The Church clock is regularly maintained by Steve Highton, but requires a full overhaul every few years and that is very expensive, requiring an expert horologist. And then to top it off there is the ever present cost of insurance. At some point, no doubt, one of our amenities will require some serious maintenance and refurbishment but we plan to delay that day for as long as possible. Our aim is the preserve the amenities under our care for the village and for the future. We do not seek to improve them, merely to pass them on, well maintained, to the next generation.

We plan to undertake a survey of all the amenities as this has not been done for some time and we need to identify the potential risks. We also plan to investigate the opportunities for grants to pay for any major works.

We hope this clarifies our things and that you enjoy the various facilities and Steve promises to try and keep the church clock telling the correct time.

Your Village, Your Heritage

As part of developing the Neighbourhood Plan, a detailed assessment of the village's heritage is being prepared, which will aim to capture all of the things which make the village special. Subjects to be covered include the history of the castle, the laying out the town ditch and street grid, the historical development of the settlement, the historic buildings and the ways in which the village continued to change up to the present day. We want as many people as possible to be involved in this process, and as the summer goes on, the Neighbourhood Plan team will be putting on a series of heritage-themed events, including an illustrated talk on the village's heritage and an evening guided walk around the village, so that everyone can get involved and have their say.

To get the ball rolling, the Neighbourhood Plan team have organised for a guided tour of the Norfolk Record Office, next to County Hall on the edge of Norwich. The tour is free and will take place on Friday 20th July from 10am–12pm, during which it will be possible to find out more about the work of the Norfolk Record Office, go behind the scenes and look at many of the important historic documents and maps of the village which the Record Office holds.

Bugs and Blooms

With the warmer weather and the approach of the school holidays, just a reminder that the church garden, which is managed by the parish council, is an open space available to all.

The whole area is now a wildlife conservation area, so there are interesting areas of rough grass to explore.

Ideas included building bug hotels (suggested by the children in the Neighbourhood Plan), treasure hunts, nature I-Spy, etc, plus a visit from the Norfolk Wildlife Trust. 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Old Buckenham Open Gardens

Some fifteen gardens will be open in Old Buckenham on Saturday 30th June and Sunday 1st July. This will be the first time for fourteen years that the villagers have opened their gardens to the public and it is all for a very good cause. All Saints' church, unusual for its octagonal tower and thatched roof, is desperately in need of re-thatching before damage is done to the church's interior.

Thatching is expensive with such a large area to be re-covered, around £100,000 will be needed to complete the work. Many different fundraising events have taken place in the village over the last eighteen months, ranging from afternoon teas to a 10K running race and a visit from the Bishop of Norwich.

Fifteen individual gardens, of all shapes and sizes, will be open for others to go round and see what they look like. Some are works in progress and others are much more established. Visitors will be able to pick up details of all the gardens and a map of their locations from 11am on both days from the Church Rooms (NR17 1RP) in Old Buckenham. The majority are situated around the large village Green and can be reached on foot while others may need travel by bike or car. Refreshments will be available each day at the Church Rooms.

Entry to all the group of gardens is £5 (accompanied children free).

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New Buckenham Parish Council

Our next Parish Council meeting will be held on Tuesday 10th July at 7.30pm in the Large Meeting Room at the Village Hall. A warm welcome is extended to all parishioners. The agenda will be posted on our notice board on the Village Green a few days prior to the meeting. In addition, details of our meetings and other information about the Parish Council can be found on our website www.newbuckenhampc.info The notice board is also a good place to publicise village and charity events - please deliver any posters to 9 St Martin's Gardens.

There were two issues which were the subject of intense discussion at our last meeting, both of which we feel can be resolved with co-operation and consideration.

One was a complaint about the amount of dog excrement on the cricket pitch and the play area which led on to a discussion about dogs being allowed to roam on, or indeed, being taken on to the play area, even in to the fenced off toddler area. We are lucky to have a lovely play area which is very well used and it is great to see everyone enjoying these facilities in an age where computers in bedrooms are the norm for many youngsters. The Parish Council has a duty to ensure that these facilities can be used safely – in addition to the problem of excrement, which is unpleasant and can lead to serious health issues, some children are fearful of dogs and cannot enjoy their play times if there are dogs running around the equipment. The Parish Council is currently looking at signage at the Play Area – there is a sign which says “No Dogs” but perhaps it doesn't make it clear that dogs are not allowed ANYWHERE on the Play Area or near the play equipment. I am sure that everyone understands why we have to say this and the Parish Council thanks you for your co-operation and consideration in this matter.

The second issue was parking – individuals parking in one or two areas is causing problems and we are hoping that a quiet word will resolve this. However, parking in Boosey's Walk is causing some major problems – if you are parking in the vicinity, please would you be kind enough to consider the people who live on or drive through the road? It is difficult to negotiate at times and it would be difficult for emergency vehicles to access it if they needed to. It is

back to co-operation and consideration when you are parking and hopefully this issue can soon be resolved. Many thanks.

I will finish with a reminder that all Parish Council meetings are open to the public and take place on the second Tuesday of every month with the exception of August when we don't usually meet.

Remaining dates for 2018 are 11th September; 9th October; 13th November and 11th December.

Summary of Draft Minutes June 2018

1. Apologies were received and accepted from Cllrs Chirodian and Dowson.
2. Minutes of the May meeting were approved as correct.
3. Matters Arising, it was noted that the work being carried out at The Forge was being done in consultation with the Listed Building Officer at Breckland Council.
4. District Councillor Report
 - a) 12 members of the public had attended the Breckland Council Cabinet Meeting.
 - b) a new interim service is to be set up in 3 Breckland Market towns to provide support for those applying for Universal Credit. This would be available in Attleborough Library, Monday 2pm–5pm and Thursday 10am–2pm.
5. Parish Councillor Reports

It was suggested that information about Parish Councillors should be put in *Parish News*.
6. Parishioners Comments
 - a) Concerns were raised about a vehicle habitually being parked by the Village Pump.

- b) New residents in Boosey's Walk raised issues of inconsiderate parking outside their property. Whilst accepting there is no legal right to park in front of their home they sought the help of the PC to resolve the situation amicably. Cllr Manning and Cllr Dowson to speak to residents concerned.

7. Planning

a) New Applications

Rose Cottage, Chapel Street: demolish garage and replace with cart shed and store, demolish outdoor toilet and shed to create patio area with French doors to existing sitting room, remove lean to structure and replace with two storey extension. Resolved, no objection from PC, but it is understood that Planning Officers from Breckland have discussed changes to provide additional parking space.

St Mary's Residential Home: erection of 3 non-illuminated signs. Resolved no objection from PC.

b) Recent Decisions

Oak View, Marsh Lane: single storey side extension, approved with conditions.

8. Financial Matters

a) Financial Report for May was noted.

b) Payments for June approved.

c) Resolved to approve Annual Internal Report.

d) Annual Governance Statement approved and signed by Chairman and Clerk.

e) Accounting Statements approved and signed by Chairman and Clerk.

f) Annual Governance and Accountability return submitted to External Auditor subject to further clarification of Neighbourhood Plan funding.

g) Final Accounts for 2017/18 approved.

9. Moat Lane Pothole Repairs

Council noted a request from the Village Hall Trust regarding large potholes approaching the Hall. The Trust wondered if repair work might be community funded as ownership has not been established. Proposal deferred until costing estimates were received.

10. Two Wheel Tuesday

Cllr Bingham raised issues of motorcycles speeding through the village. Resolved that a letter be drafted outlining the PC's concerns to be sent to Norfolk Police and Crime Commissioner.

11. Amenities

a) Allotments: holder of allotment 15 has surrendered plot and it has now been let to the next person on the waiting list.

b) Closed Churchyard: Council considered a letter from the PCC to discuss maintenance issues. Resolved to engage Smart Gardens to do 5 hours gardening each month in the formal area of the Closed Churchyard at £12.00 per hour. Cllr Bingham has discussed with Phil Anderson the work to be done on the Wildlife Area.

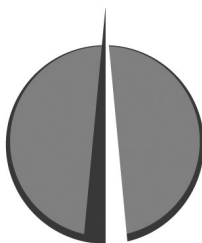
c) Play Area
