

News From the Pews End-of-Year Review

From the Churchwarden: As we come to the end of the year, it's time to say a very big thank you to everyone who has helped us during the last 12 months – and there are a lot of people to thank, so here goes!

You will have seen that yet more work has gone on in the Churchyard over recent months and we are very grateful to Phil Anderson for his work in keeping the grass mown and for clearing the lime tree near the gate; it was threatening to engulf our neighbours in the cottage next door and making getting through the gate challenging. We are also very appreciative of the support from the Parish Council, who have the responsibility for maintaining the Churchyard, in carrying out repairs to the wall and for clearing the area along the Church Street side, so that we can extend the area for burial of ashes.

Thank you to the Fundraisers and Tony Lister, for their donations as a result of all their hard work organising major village events and recycling collections. The funds they donate to us are invaluable.

If you have been into the church very recently, you will have noticed work going on to the repair the porch — and that there is now a rather splendid light in there, worked on a sensor so that in the dark no-one is stumbling around. We have also arranged for the Victorian lamp in the Churchyard to be repaired, thanks to Jamie Bowering, and we hope to have the electrics reconnected soon, again on a sensor, so that you don't have to grope your way along the path. Barbara Cattermole has been instrumental in getting these works done. Barbara is our amazing PCC Secretary, so huge thanks to her for all she does for us!

There is also a roll of honour for everyone who keeps the inside of the church looking so good: Margaret Ward does the wonderful weekly fresh flower arrangements; Fi and Jeremy Gallimore and Jimpy continue their campaign against the spiders' web, bat poo and dust; and I'm sure you have noticed the flags that go up and down, and the lighted cross at Christmas – we couldn't do that without Nigel Lond-Caulk. We salute you, Nigel! The very popular book stall is kept in order by Susie Hilton-Jowett and Kathie Steel, so thank them for the wonderful fiction you can read! Our thanks, too, to Sue Green, who volunteered to repair the fall on the pulpit, having noticed its rather parlous state. Finally, and by absolutely no means least, a massive thank you to our Verger, Susie, who does so much.

Parish Council Meeting Dates for 2024

All meetings are held on the second Tuesday of the month at 7:30pm in the Village Hall.

The Parish Council does not meet in August.

Summary of Draft Minutes November 2023

Present: Karen Hobley (KH), Chair; Mary Manning (MM); Paul Martin (PM); Andrew Bingham (AB); Don Crossman (DC); Steve Highton (SH); Angela Thornton (AH), Clerk. Also in attendance, 1 parishioner.

1. Minutes of the October meeting, with amendment, confirmed as correct.

2. Matters Arising

- a) Village Gateway: Parish Partnership application process submitted.
- b) Defibrillator: installation at the King's Head by end of Nov.
- c) County Broadband Wayleave Agreement: still with solicitors.
- d) Establishment of community woodland: 1st-choice potential site unavailable. 2nd site not viable. 3rd choice to be investigated.
- e) Electric Charging Point: NBVHT agreed to progress subject to satisfactory insurance.
- f) NBPC email services: awaiting progress. Action AT.

3. Public Participation

- a) Parish Cllrs
 - i) MM requested, on behalf of the Village Directory, a donation of £150.00. Agreed, AT to add to the payments list for November.
 - ii) MM stated that villagers have reported that the top end of the Common is very overgrown. Action AT to report to Highways and Carleton Rode PC.

- iii) MM stated that the Neighbourhood Plan reports are not on the website. Action AT.
- iv) KH proposed a £50 donation to the British Legion agreed. Action AT to add to November payments.

b) Parishioner

- i) Amanda Hartley (AH) suggested that villagers may like a village sign. AH to canvas the village for views.
- ii) AH suggested that the PC could enter the village into Anglia in Bloom. Following discussion it was decided to approach the organisers of Open Gardens to involve children and include the Children's Garden in this event.

4. Financial Matters

- a) Bank reconciliation for October approved.
- b) Payments for November approved.
- c) Cllrs noted and approved the payment on Health and Safety grounds the payment for the Play Area stepping stones.
- d) Cllrs received the draft budget for 2024/5. Cllrs requested revised draft budget with 3 precept options for consideration next meeting.

5. Amenities

- a) Closed Churchyard
 - i) Work to prepare the churchyard for extending the memorial garden and the repairs to the flint walls have led to an overspend of £150.
 - ii) Following discussion and advice from the PCC it was decided that the PCC could not financially support the refurbishment of the Victorian Lamppost.

iii) Period Pointing are booked in May 2024 to continue the repairs of the flint wall. A draft budget of £3,000 has been allocated for Quinquennial Report work in 2024/5.

b) Cemetery

Registration on the Diocesan system is in place to allow reuse of graves. Await PCC Minute to progress paperwork.

c) Allotments

- i) BTS have completed maintenance work. Compost bin needs to be moved. Action AT to contact BTS. Cllrs discussed the use of the cleared area which may already have been used to dump rubbish. MM suggested that allotment owners may have a view on its use. AT to coordinate owners' views.
- ii) Broken gates, PM to repair/investigate.
- iii) There are 4 vacant plots. KH to place article in PN.
- iv) It was proposed and agreed that in future only one plot per resident will be allocated.

d) Play Area

- i) DC arranged for urgent replacement of stepping stones.
- ii) Mushroom seats to be repaired or replaced.
- iii) Proposed that £1,000 to be allocated to Play Area improvement budget 2024/5.

e) Public Footpaths

MM clarified that the bridge on path 2 is the responsibility of NCC, they have been notified electronically.

f) Street Lights

Quotes from TT Jones were discussed for the dimming of the lights at midnight and shields to prevent glare into properties.

Whizzbangs!

A Prose Poem

In 1605, the King was not assassinated.

The whizzbang powder, which would have assassinated the King and murdered over 200 other people and destroyed lots of homes, was not lit.

In 1606, the law said that people must give thanks for the life of the King who was not assassinated by going to church and lighting bonfires. At this time, whizzbangs were not available for ordinary people so the giving of thanks was much quieter.

From 1900, 295 years after the King who was not assassinated died, ANYBODY could buy whizzbangs. And they did.

In 1914, the war to end all wars started.

In 1918, men who had been fighting in the war to end all wars were executed for trying to escape the whizzbangs, which had deeply traumatised them.

In 1921, the red poppy was adopted as a symbol of remembrance and hope for all those people affected by the whizzbangs.

In 1939, 21 years after the war to end all wars finished, another war began.

In 1954, a class of school boys co-ordinated the slamming of their desk lids. Their teacher, who had first hand experience of fighting with the whizzbangs and was deeply traumatised by them, hid under his table, weeping. The noise had reminded him of his terrible fear and what he had seen.

In 1959, the law which celebrated the life of the King who had not been assassinated, but had been dead for 354 years, ended. But the people still celebrated with bonfires and whizzbangs.

In 2004, a law was passed that said only grown ups could buy

whizzbangs. But, five-year-old children were still allowed to hold spitting, lighted sticks that burned at 2000°f, hot enough to melt some metals and to cause serious burns.

In 2022, Russia fired whizzbangs at Ukraine.

In May 2022, people started to leave Ukraine to escape the danger and trauma of the whizzbangs. Some of them came to live in our village.

In November 2022, people still celebrated the life of the King who had not been assassinated, but had been dead for 417 years, with bonfires and whizzbangs.

In October 2023, Gaza fired whizzbangs at Israel. Now, many people are firing whizzbangs at each other.

On 5th November 2023, people still celebrated the life of the King who had not been assassinated, but had been dead for 418 years, with bonfires and whizzbangs.

On 11th November 2023, people gathered together to remember the people who had been deeply traumatised by whizzbangs. They stood still, and quiet, for two minutes thinking about them and all the other people who continue to be traumatised by whizzbangs in our fracturing world.

Then, there were no more whizzbangs in the village. The wild birds stopped being afraid. Bats could flit around in the dark no longer affected by the huge flashing lights reaching high into the sky. Owls, who have the best hearing ever, could hear their next meal. Cats and dogs no longer trembled in fear. Horses no longer reared up in terror trying to escape the noise of the whizzbangs.

November settled back into its 'season of mists and mellow fruitfulness' although it rained a lot and was very windy which does not feel very mellow or help the fruitfulness.

At the end of November there was a bright full moon.

We could forget about the whizzbangs, and celebrating the life of the King who had not been assassinated and has been dead for 418 years, and quietly reflect on what we do have, and to care for the important things around us.

And, around the village, a few Flanders poppies were still flowering.

Bats in New Buckenham 2023

The international science boffin, Dr Stuart Newson (otherwise known in our village as Batman Superior), has been fundamental in enabling our bat surveys to continue throughout the Covid-19 pandemic and all the lockdowns, when almost everyone else in Norfolk has been forced to stop.

It was Dr Newson who invented the citizen science technology which makes it possible for ordinary folk to record bat sounds overnight and then to find out, accurately, which species they are. You could register your interest, choose a mapped kilometre square and borrow the kit from the local library. Of course, when libraries closed and people were forced into isolation – not to mention the general panic and fear about bats – his brilliant surveys were stopped in their tracks. But not here in New Buckenham! Stuart lent the kit to us and New Buckenham carried on with the readings.

For those who have been wondering what the tech involves, it's this: a 7-foot mast with a microphone attached to the top; a lead from the microphone plugs into a small plastic box containing batteries, operations buttons, screens and the SD card which will collect the data. Depending on the time of year, it is set to function from about an hour before dusk and to close down after sunrise. Many bats fly in daylight, not just in darkness.

Once put in position and switched on, the bat box will 'go to sleep' until awoken by the sound wave of a bat, at which point it records and goes back to sleep. It takes only seconds, but by the end of a busy bat night, it will have collected literally thousands of echolocators, stored them as WAV files on the SD card, and 'gone to sleep' again until the next night. Then comes the fun bit: I access the relevant website which unscrambles all the numbers and tells me what happened whilst I was asleep.

The great news is that, despite all the change and upheaval due to Covid-19 and exceptional weather, this village has a large population of rare bats. Without Stuart's kit we would never have known. There are 18 species of bat in Great Britain and at least 11 of them are right here. Even better, amongst them are the rarest of all. All 11 are to be found across the village, the Green and the Common, but the number of Barbastelles and Serotines zooming along Cuffer Lane and making good use of the fields and ponds, is noticeably higher. It's likely that the trees, hedges and ponds here, as well as the short direct route from the Common makes it a good feeding ground.

The GB Red List includes six species of bat in real peril. The top two are only found on the south coast, but examples of the other four species are all to be found in New Buckenham. The most threatened of those four are Barbastelle and Serotine. Next on the list as 'near threatened' are Leisler's Bat and Nathusius' Pipistrelle.

Other UK bats found here in New Buckenham are: Brown long-eared bats, Brandt's bat, common pipistrelle, Daubenton's bat, Noctule, Soprano pipistrelle, and Natterer's bat.

The Red List for British Mammals has been produced by the Mammal Society on behalf of Natural England, Natural Resources Wales, Scottish Natural Heritage (NatureScot) and the Joint Nature Conservation Committee.


