The Rarest Bats in Britain are in New Buckenham

It may seem early for the bats to be whizzing about the village...but it seems everything on the green scene has been happening earlier.

Despite poor, rainy, cold weather at the end of April and the beginning of May, the bats were determined to get out and about. The first readings were done up Cuffer Lane and reveal a fabulous collection of some of the rarest bats. The second readings were done around Chapel Street.

There are 18 species of bat in the UK, 17 of which actually breed here. Of these, incredibly, New Buckenham has, in past years, recorded 12 species.

The Barbastelle is one of the rarest and is listed as endangered or vulnerable in most European countries. The first known breeding colony was discovered in 1996 in Norfolk. All species have declined in recent decades. The mouse-eared bat became extinct in 1991.

The Bat Conservation Trust (www.bats.org.uk/about-bats/what-are-bats/uk-bats) lists a number of features that threaten bats: building and development work that affects roosts, loss of habitat, the severing of commuting routes by roads and threats in the home including cat attacks, flypaper and some chemical treatments of building materials. Other potential threats can include wind turbines and lighting if they are sited on key bat habitats or near roosts.

All bats are protected. Under the 'IUCN (International Union for the Conservation of Nature) Red List' criteria, each species is allocated one of the following categories relating to the imminent risk of extinction: Critically Endangered (CE); Endangered (EN); Vulnerable (V); Near Threatened (NT); Least Concern (LC); Data Deficient (DD); and Not Assessed (NA).

Don't go away thinking that LC ("least concern") means there is no panic for certain types. The most numerous species and the one that most people have heard of is the Pipistrelle. But its numbers fell by 60% between 1978 and 1986.

So far, our check list looks like this. Covid brought recordings to a halt in many places. The Norfolk Bat Survey operators are delighted that, in this village, the data gathering goes on.

1. Election of Chair

4. Matters Arising

a) Village Gateway: NCC have confirmed the award. PC has paid their contribution of £512.

The Forget-me-Not

Although the forget-me-not, a tiny five petalled blue flower with a yellow centre, with several flower heads on a single stem may appear to be a perennial, it isn't. A perennial plant is one that grows in the same place year after year, dying back in the winter and appearing again in its expected season.

The forget-me-not is a biennial with a lifespan of two years. During its first year, the plant establishes itself but does not flower, only doing so in its second year before dying back permanently. However, it produces 700 or so seeds per small plant making it a prodigious self-sower, giving the impression that it is coming up in the same spot year after year. It usually blooms from May to October with the first seeds reaching maturity in June.

The forget-me-not is part of the Boraginaceae family which are plants that have a cluster of flowers on each stem and leaves covered in rough hairs like mouse ears. This gives the plant its botanical name 'myosotis' a combination of the Greek words 'mus' and 'otis' meaning 'mouse ear'. Another name is scorpion grass. As the flower stem unfurls prior to blooming it resembles the curl of a scorpion's tail.

According to Greek myth Zeus was busy naming all the plants. Thinking he had completed his task a small blue flower, fearing being left out cried, 'forget me not!'. Hence it became rather lazily and unimaginatively named the forget-me-not.

Another story about its name comes from a German legend. A handsome knight in shining armour was walking by the riverside with his lady love wanting to impress her. Clanking along in his rather noisy and heavy suit he spied a patch of the sweetest blue flowers near the water's edge. Gallantly, and somewhat precariously, he bent and grasped the flowers to give to his lady love but toppled into the water. As he sank, owing to the weight of his armour, he threw the flowers to her and with his last breath called out, 'forget me not!'

Perhaps, not forgetting this traumatic incident, she found a knight with rather more common sense than to lean over deep water in a heavy suit of armour with its inevitable and less than favourable outcome.

Like several other wildflowers used medicinally, the forget-me-not has diuretic and anti-inflammatory properties. When crushed and applied to a small cut it could be used to slow down bleeding and was also used to stem nosebleeds.

In Chinese medicine, made into a vitamin c rich herbal tea to speed the metabolism, this nourishing infusion was drunk to prevent the appearance of wrinkles and dark skin spots.

Apparently resembling the blue eyes of the virgin Mary, the forget-menot was made into a treatment for eye infections. This came from a belief in the 'Doctrine of Signatures'. Apparently, if a plant resembled any part of the human body by that very nature, or signature, it could successfully treat an ailment in that area. Dioscórides who practised medicine in ancient Rome wrote in the year 65: "The herb Scorpius resembles the tail of a scorpion and is good against his biting."

By implication of its name, the forget-me-not is a symbol of friendship, love, hope and remembrance. Henry IV adopted it during his exile in 1393 and during the American civil war soldiers would press them into letters home to their loved ones. To the Victorians, for whom the language of flowers held great significance, the forget-me-not was a symbol of true love and devotion.

The Alzheimer's Society has adopted the flower as their emblem. Along with other symptoms, the often-distressing loss of memory is the one most associated with dementia therefore the forget-me-not is the perfect token to represent the organisation.

My theory is that the forget-me-not is so called as it pops up not only where you expect it to but in all sorts of other places. In its easy profusion it is saying, 'You will forget-me-not!'


