The PC is very conscious of the need to minimise the long term impact on the village of new infrastructure, particularly overhead cables which are unsightly and impact on the historic setting of the village. The Parish Council has no powers to prevent new poles and overhead cables being installed, we are discussing this work with Breckland who do have some very limited powers to influence what is installed. Between both organisations we will try and work with County Broadband to ensure as much cabling as possible is laid below ground. 1. Minutes approved May meeting subject to:

Cllr Steve Askew was in attendance.

SH reported storage materials, possibly building materials, on a field behind the houses on Marsh Lane.

2. Matters Arising

- a) Village Gateway: no further progress.
- b) County Broadband Wayleave agreement: still pending.

The Dandelion

Like the daisy, the dandelion opens at day break and closes as the light fades. From the Asteraceae family, the dandelion's Latin name is Taraxacum Officinale. Taraxacum derived from the Arabic meaning 'bitter herb' and officinale indicating that it is of pharmaceutical value. Dandelion is a corruption of the French 'dente-di-leone', which in English is 'lions' teeth', not from the appearance of the flower, but from its jagged leaves. Being one of the earliest wild flowers to appear in the spring and continuing to flower for many months, the dandelion has many uses to both wildlife and people.

If you are a gardener who does not like dandelions in their flower bed or lawn, you know that they grow just about anywhere and are very difficult to remove completely. A perennial, meaning it will appear year after year, an individual plant can live up to 13 years if left undisturbed. The dandelion's tap root can be up to 10 inches long and even the smallest part left in the earth has the potential to grow into another plant. Appearing between March and October, the vivid yellow flowers bloom for only two days before they close tightly allowing the seeds to form inside. The round, fluffy seed head matures in 10 to 14 days. As it is does so, the flower stem grows taller making the mature seed head more exposed to the scattering breeze.

With its early flowering, the dandelion is an important part of the food chain supporting over 50 species of insect including bees, wasps, flies and moths. Although the pollen is of poor nutritional value to honey bees, they readily consume it. In turn, the birds eat the insects adding to the vital wildlife food chain. Each dandelion plant can produce up to ten flowers which then creates 150 seeds per head. That's 1,500 seeds with the ability to travel 500m on the wind! The seeds are also food for goldfinches and house sparrows. The Royal Horticultural Society has added the dandelion to its 'Plants for Pollinators' list of wild flowers. The dandelion has no preference for

any particular soil type, even growing on impoverished ground found on building sites. Hence its proliferation.

Dandelions have been used for culinary and medical purposes for centuries around the world. They contain more vitamin A than spinach and also contain iron, calcium and potassium. As a diuretic, the leaves will help reduce fluid build up in the body. By helping the kidneys remove salt and water through the urine, the amount of fluid flowing through the veins is reduced which lowers blood pressure. Herbalists use dandelion root to detoxify the liver and gall bladder. The dandelion may also help improve the immune system, as studies have shown that dandelion extract reduces viruses' ability to replicate. The white sap in the stem, a form of latex, is the only inedible part of the plant. However, it will help to heal minor wounds on the skin if applied directly.

The rest of the dandelion is edible. Baked and ground into powder, the root makes a tolerable coffee substitute with no caffeine and without the bitter dandelion taste. The flowers can be made into wine (I've done it at the time it was fashionable to make hedgerow wines), put into salads, battered and deep fried, and the petals used as garnish. The leaves can be used in any dish, raw or cooked, where you may use other more conventional edible leaves.

As a child one summer, I remember cycling along the country lanes with my younger brother. It was hot, we were thirsty and had not taken any water with us. We came across a dilapidated garage with a single petrol pump and little shop selling a few sweets and dusty, warm bottles of Corona. With a few sticky pennies found in the saddle bag, we had just enough for a bottle of Dandelion and Burdock between us. Heaven! It was like nothing we had ever tasted before; slightly medicinal but so good! The fizzy brown liquid had probably been nowhere near anything as natural as either dandelion or burdock. No fizzy drink has hit the spot so well since.

If the taste of the dandelion was not to your liking, you could always make it into a fabric dye. With three different useful components to the plant it was possible by boiling then leaving the root, flower or leaves to steep for some hours, to produce either a brown, green or yellow dye.

The dandelion is also rich in folklore. It is often known as 'wet-the-bed', which reflects its diuretic properties. Every child who comes across the dandelion seed head is taught to blow the seeds from the dandelion clock counting the time. It was also called the 'shepherd's clock' as the flower opened early in the morning as the shepherd went off to tend to his flock and closed at the end of his day.

Other stories surrounding the seed head are that the seeds are really fairies and by blowing they are released from the grasp of the plant. As a 'thank you' the fairies carry away your dreams and wishes granting that they come true.

Woven into a wedding bouquet, dandelions bring good luck to the newly married couple. Maybe this comes from the flower's tenacity, strong root and long flowering season signifying the same qualities hoped for in marriage.

Wiccan beliefs indicated that if dandelions were put in the north-east part of the house they would keep away the cold north winds.

If you are able to blow all the seed heads away in one breath it means the person you love will love you equally in return. However, if some seeds remain – beware! Your lover may have reservations about their feelings for you.

The dandelion was used in magic and divination. The seed head can also be used as symbolic banishing magic. Put everything that troubles you into the seed head then blow them all away. Drinking dandelion tea before sleep gave lucid dreams and an opening into the other world.

There are more than 240 varieties of dandelion, so you are likely to find some form of the plant throughout the whole year. Over the decades we, as gardeners, have been encouraged to despise the dandelion and given many (mostly toxic) recipes for ridding our lawns and gardens of this important plant. This wasn't always the case. Prior to the discovery of modern medicine, the dandelion was cherished and allowed to grow. Before the pristine lawn became fashionable the GRASS was removed allowing the dandelion to thrive!

If we are able to remove our blinkers and turn a deaf ear to the weed killer adverts, perhaps we will be able to appreciate the dandelion for what it is – a beautiful, bright flower valuable to biodiversity and the environment with the potential to give huge joy!
